

Kia ora Whanau,

As we approach the end of Term 1 we think back to our successes this term.

Most recently we had 21 students take part in the **Weetbix Tryathlon** at Waitangi, and as you will hear from Jethro and Lewis, fun was had by all.

We trained hard all of Term 1 to prepare ourselves for on the day, and the hard work paid off. Within a half hour of finishing their race, most of our athletes were ready to go again!



There has been a rule at Moerewa School dating back nearly 10 years that says our children **must** wear a helmet if they are going to ride their bike to and from school.

It is the law, and more importantly, cycle helmets can save lives. Cycle helmets can be purchased from the Warehouse for as little as \$7, a small price to pay to keep our tamariki safe.

From next term we will be re-insisting that this happen and if your child refuses to wear a helmet we expect you to support us telling your child they can not ride to school without one.

We will also be teaching them how wearing bright colours while cycling helps drivers to see you and further reduces the risk of accident. We will also have a "Wear Bright Colours to School" mufti day.

There will be prizes and giveaways to reinforce this positive message.

Finally, **our school Facebook page**. We sent out a questionnaire recently as we felt this could really improve our communication with parents quickly and more easily.

Many other schools had spoken to me about the ease of letting their parents know what was happening in the school and the positive comments by far outweighed the negative.

Approximately 80% of respondents said YES to a school facebook page, but this dropped to around 60% when asked should we post photos of the children engaged in learning activities (either at school or on trips).






Whanau Kopunui


Conrad cutting out his cross for his ANZAC stand


Kopunui participating in trust activities this term, working together and helping each other.
