VACCINATION REGISTER

Recently the Ministry of Education provided schools with a privacy statement that schools need to use to meet our obligations for putting in place a vaccine register. As we have children 12 years and over this includes our school.

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

Vaccine information will be kept on our Student Management System (SMS) in the same manner as we record all other immunisation records. The privacy statement and a questionnaire will be sent home today. This questionnaire should be completed regardless of whether your child has been vaccinated or not. Please return to office asap.

As we prepare for 2022, teachers will be asking whanau to register as a whanau helper/volunteer in the event of school trips, overnight stays etc. This will enable us to plan activities with the support of whanau. 


Swim safe with Torongare. Our tamariki had

Whanau Taumarere






