WELLBEING

Hauora Hub is a regular feature each month with the lovely Khyla Rupapera from the Ngati Hine Health Trust coming in to check our tamariki for sore throats and general health checks. We also have our Public Health Nurse, Kate Townsend visit each fortnight. Sore throats matter whanau! **15-25% of sore throats are caused by the Strep A.** Health advice for those who have tested positive for Strep A. They should not attend school for 24 hours after starting the first course of antibiotics. This will help prevent the infection spreading to other people.

We offer throat swabbing at school through our Health Nurses.



We had a great time during our whanau technology unit which focused on smoking kai, especially fish and kutai. Smoking kai can indeed add a delicious smokey flavour to the kai making it tasty and yummy. The process involves exposing the food to smoke from burning wood (manuka) which impacts a unique flavour to the kai and also helps to preserve it. Smoking kai is a traditional way of preserving food which is still practiced today. Sharing kai is a wonderful way of bringing people together and sharing memorable moments.

TERM 3 KAUPAPA - NGA WHETŪ O MATARIKI

This term we have been learning lots about *Nga whetū o Matariki*. Students have been looking at the attributes of each whetū, making connections to their own attributes and strengths and those of their whanau.

Students have been have been researching the whakapapa of <u>Nga whetū o Matariki</u> and have also learned and recited karakia associated with their chosen whetū. Towards the end of this unit of mahi, students will participate in our annual a *cook-off*, aptly named, <u>Beach to Bush</u>. Each Whanau are tasked with the challenge of foraging ingredients from either the moana, the ngahere or the awa to include in their signature dish. Each whanau will put forward 4 students to represent their whanau, prepare and cook a meal/dish to be judged!

Our next hononga is on Wednesday 7 September at Kawakawa Primary School. As a roopu we attended the High School Musical at BOIC recently.
